The project teaches animal husbandry including selecting, feeding, managing, and marketing of beef cattle. Developing teamwork, responsibility, and decisionmaking alongside both animals and people is unique to the livestock program experience. Hobbies or careers in animal agriculture enable utilization of these lifelong skills and project mastery.
